#### First Class Feedback from the 2017 Parents Survey

We are delighted to report that the parents who took part in our recent Kirkland Rowell survey were overwhelmingly positive about Penwortham Girls' High School. Like our last survey in 2015, parents judge our school to be Outstanding in all areas.

Every single subject was graded as either Good or Outstanding and it was particularly pleasing to see that:

- Over 90% of Y8-11 parents believe that the school has either maintained or improved standards since the last survey.
- Over 90% of Y7 parents believe that the school has either met or surpassed their expectations.

Parents also rated our school as either Good or Outstanding for all the non-academic criteria including exam results, caring teachers and school discipline.

Since PGHS carried out its first parents' survey in 2002, the overall performance scores have steadily

improved. We were especially pleased to see that several aspects of the school's work were held to have improved over the last four years, including school facilities, social and health education, developing moral values, community spirit, availability of resources and the school's image in the local community.

Of course, though immensely proud of the report we are never complacent. Indeed, one or two areas for improvement were identified in the survey and we are determined to address these rapidly and effectively. To this end we are about to embark on a consultation exercise with parents through our new Parent Council. We will then take the necessary steps to ensure our future success.

#### ...and it's goodbye from me

In 1981 a large black metal box was delivered to the school I was teaching in. No-one knew what to do with it



One RML 380Z computer had been given to every secondary school in England. It came with no instructions. It ran one piece of geography software on its 12 inch green screen. The internet wouldn't really become useful for another 5 years.

I was a young Science teacher at the time (there were no ICT or computing teachers in schools), so the bemused Headteacher asked me to find out what to do with it because it looked vaguely technical. You needed to go on a course not to learn how to use it but to learn how to lift it!

Luckily, about a year later the BBC released the BBC microcomputer and a wonderful television series to accompany it. ICT and programming took off. People of a certain age may remember BBC Basic:

#### 10 Print "Hello world" 20 Goto 10



This caused an unwarranted amount of excitement! I was allowed to buy 10 of them. Shortly afterwards the school was inspected and the puzzled HMI inspector wanted to know what they did as he'd never seen one.

In ICT (and now computing) a lot has happened in the subsequent 30-odd years. The new BBC Micro: bit has more computing power than its predecessor at a fraction of the size and is a brilliant way of teaching young people coding and 'computational thinking'. A new language has arisen of algorithms, iteration, de-bugging and concatenation (my favourite word). It works with strings by the way....



After a teaching career of 39 years I'm now bowing out after an extremely rewarding four years here at Penwortham Girls' High School. I've had the privilege of working with a wonderfully dedicated staff and bright, motivated pupils.

I would like to wish the new Head of Faculty, Mrs Smith, all the best in her new role and hope she will be as happy as I've been here.


#### Drama Department News

his year we have taken part in choosing and deciding which book we felt deserved to win the Lancashire book of the year award from 92 books.

We were given 30 books at a time and challenged ourselves to read as many books as we could. Aiming to read all of the books gave us the chance to read genres we wouldn't usually engage with. After a month and a half we went to meetings to discuss our opinions on each book with three other schools across the county. This allowed us to interact with other people and hear different opinions on the books we had read.

After each meeting, we were sent back to school with a new box of books to read over that 6 six weeks. This process was repeated until we had been given the chance to read the entire 'long list'. We gathered opinions from our classmates to decide on our top ten choice of books which consisted of various genres and we felt these books deserved a chance to win the award.

Later, we were invited to County Hall in Preston city centre where the overall top ten was revealed. This short list was put together by all of the schools involved using their top tens. We then had the chance to read any of the books on the final shortlist that we had not yet read which gave us the chance to judge every book fairly. Two representatives from each school came to County Hall two months later to ultimately decide which books were our favourites and earn the possibility of winning the award.

Taking part in this event exposed us to many different styles of writing which, on an everyday basis, we would not pick up. We feel our vocabulary and social skills have greatly improved thanks to the opportunities this competition brought us. We met up with many different people and realised the different views people can have on a book, which later encouraged us to read that book.

#### Summer Reads

he Mystery of the Clockwork Sparrow By Katherine Woodfine

The Mystery of the Clockwork Sparrow is set in Sinclair's department store; a posh, busy and crowded place for rich people to spend their money on luxury items.



Throughout the novel there are colourful descriptions of the lavish store. The story centres around the characters of Sophie, an intelligent shop girl who organises products in the store, Billy, a porter who enjoys problem solving and reading mystery books and Lil, Sophie's friend who is brave, helpful and certainly doesn't care what anyone thinks of her. All the events that take place are centred around the new store opening and Mr Sinclair's exhibition of priceless artefacts.

Sophie, the protagonist of the story, is underestimated by everyone but her friends and, as readers, we desperately want her to succeed in everything she does. Although the characters in the book are the most engaging part of the story, there are also some wonderful illustrations in the book, including newspaper articles and a shopping list which make it exciting to read and brings it to life; you feel constantly immersed in the story. Another positive about the book is the way it is structured and how the events unfold because you never know what will happen next; it is tempting to skip parts and just read the ending. Every chapter ends with a cliff-hanger and you are left in suspense wanting to keep reading and reading until you reach the conclusion.

Even though you can easily get swept along with the story, at times the description of the story seems too long and detailed. The mystery adventure only really gets going about a third of the way into the story. However, as soon as the action begins to pick up pace, don't be surprised if you find yourself finishing the book sooner than you thought you would!

Anyone who enjoys reading mysteries would enjoy reading this book (boys and girls over the age of 8 or 9). There are similarities to Enid Blyton's adventures (a group of friends solve a mystery) but we'd suggest that Woodfine's book is suitable for older children. We give this book 4 stars.

#### Year 10 Food Preparation and Nutrition Mock Exam

Year 10 were able to pick from three product briefs:

- Increasing the fibre content of dishes
- Cuisine from the Mediterranean culture
- Cooking for a vegetarian

Preparation time included the tasks below:

- research and analyse the life stage, dietary group or culinary tradition related to your chosen task
- make 3-4 dishes to showcase a range of practical skills
- prepare, cook and present a final menu of three dishes, planning in advance how this will be achieved
- prepare, cook and present your final dishes in one threehour practical session.

The final dishes looked spectacular and displayed an array of skills and techniques.

The girls worked under pressure and stuck to detailed time plans. They enjoyed the experience but commented on how tiring the day had been and how time planning and organisational skills had been essential.









### Year 9 Curry Making and Chapatti Workshop

International cuisine is an essential part of the new food preparation and nutrition specification.

This is introduced at key stage three and Year 9 pupils cook curries from various parts of the world. These include a Thai, Indian and Moroccan curry. Pupils look at the basics of a curry sauce, tenderising meat and the use of lower fat substitutes e.g. crème fraiche, and greek yoghurt. Spices and their health benefits form part of the research.

Chapattis and naan bread are made in the bread making section and specialist equipment is used. This accompanies the curry section.

#### Maths Department News

#### Year 9 Maths Inspiration Visit, Liverpool

n 22nd June a group of enthusiastic Year 9 pupils, along with Mr McVey and Mrs Davies, visited the Capstone Theatre in Liverpool to watch the 'Maths Inspiration' lectures.

The lectures were delivered by three renowned maths speakers:

- Helen Pilcher, who writes for the science magazine Nature. She is also one half of the Comedy Research Project, a stand-up comedy duo who spent long hours deriving the mathematical formula for the perfect joke!
- Rob Eastaway, an author whose books on everyday maths include the bestselling "Why Do Buses Come In Threes?" and "The Hidden Maths of Sport". He appears regularly on BBC Radio 4 and 5 Live to talk about the maths of everyday life and has given maths talks across the world to audiences of all ages.
- Ben Sparks, who is, amongst other things, a mathematician, a musician, and a twin. He has
  busked around the world, but still gets unashamedly excited about the good bits of maths.
  He works at the University of Bath for the Further Maths Support Programme delivering
  maths lectures and workshops around the country.

The lectures were based around a series of interactive games that involved either lots of strategy, just plain luck or a mixture of both. One game involved the presenter having a bet with the audience that someone in the front four rows would share a birthday with someone else. Pupils were asked if they would wager £1 against the bet with a chance to win £100. The related probabilities were investigated and it soon became clear that the presenter's money was pretty safe!





Logic and reasoning was also a focal point, with one presentation centred on an analysis of the flak damage incurred by Lancaster bombers during World War Two. Most of the damage found on the returning planes was on the fuselage so engineers initially thought they should reinforce the fuselages of the bombers ready for future missions. However, when logical reasoning was applied it became apparent (and somewhat obvious when you think about it!) that the planes that returned home sustained the least amount of damage to their engines.

Hence the engineers realised that the engines, rather than the fuselage, should be reinforced to improve the chances of the bombers making it back to base successfully.

Kiera McLernon who was lucky enough go up on stage to take part in one of the games said; "I found the visit really interesting and saw how maths is used in real life. The strategy games used by the presenters also made the maths fun".

Overall, the girls enjoyed the day and came away with a different perspective and a renewed enthusiasm for mathematics and a genuine feeling that it can actually be great fun!




#### Modern Foreign Languages Department News

#### PhD Philosopher Visit

n a Friday lunchtime, Miss McDermott hosts 'Debating Society' in room 25 and this is led by Year 10 girls in order to engage younger pupils in challenging debates, usually centred on current affairs, issues raised in the news and/ or on social media.

In order to give the Year 10 girls an opportunity to focus on developing their debate skills further, on Friday 23rd June I invited John Foster (Philosophy Lecturer, Lancaster University) and Faye Tucker (PhD Philosophy student) to deliver a lunchtime session on female philosophers and feminist philosophy.

This was an excellent opportunity for girls in both Years 9 and 10 to be challenged and engage in a highly academic debate with experts in their field.

The session focused on Existentialism and how feminist philosophers such as De Beauvoir interpreted this theory in the 1940s.

#### Science Laboratory Refurbishment

ast year, Penwortham Girls' were lucky enough to be awarded a £40,000 grant from The Wolfson Foundation to support and promote excellence in education and Science.



This money was used to improve the Science facilities within school. Over the Easter holidays, two of the science rooms underwent a radical refurbishment. The old wooden benches had to be removed and were replaced with new state of

the art chemically resistant work surfaces with curved ends.

New flooring was also put in and the girls have commented on how quiet the floor is; no more stool scraping noises! The colour schemes were chosen by Mrs Goodwill, who went for red and black and Mrs Honeyman, who went for grey and green. There is still some work to be finished on the new rooms; the walls need a fresh coat of paint and this is planned for the next half term holiday. #### Design and Make It Challenge

ongratulations to the Year 9 STEM team who have won the 2017 Design and Make it Grand Final, held at Old Trafford Football ground on Friday 7th July 2017.



The girls had qualified from the Preston and district regional heat held at Ribby Hall Village in March 2017.

The winners and best runners up from all the regional competitions were then invited to compete in the Grand Final at Old Trafford. The 12 finalist teams had to design, plan, cost and pitch their proposals for either a commercial passenger aircraft, a transport aircraft or a military aircraft to a panel of judges. Each team was issued with component lists, job specifications, customer specifications, materials specifications and a host of other information that had to be decided upon and included in their presentations.

The presentations were given to representatives from industry, including BAE Systems & Tata and the students had to respond to some intensive questioning at the end of each pitch. I could not be more proud of our girls. They gave their absolute best, worked through their lunch (as did quite a few teams!) and went on to give a fantastic presentation. The fact that all other teams had eight members, (the maximum allowed) and our team had five was a testimony to how hard they had worked. This group of girls had

progressed through the qualifying rounds and wanted to keep the same team for the final, even if it meant they were at a disadvantage. In the end this proved to be no disadvantage at all as they went on the win the Grand Final, in our first time there!

As well as the trophy and voucher prizes, we also picked up a victory visit to Costa coffee on the way home, which helped pass the 2 hour rush hour drive back to school. #### Golden Nuggets

his term we have implemented a system of peer observation allowing teachers within school to observe each other in the classroom.

Research into developing teaching shows that this is an excellent vehicle to share and further enhance excellent practice. All staff took part in the programme and they were invited to observe a colleague model: a teaching technique such as collaborative learning, questioning or using new technologies such as the interactive white board. They were then asked to share their 'golden nugget', in other words the one golden idea they would take away and develop in their own classrooms.



Following this they shared some of their reflections on the peer observation schedule:

"The class was clearly engaged! I will be taking away your use of literacy throughout the lesson (questions about techniques was a great idea!) and also how you use evidence in your planning to support your tasks. Thanks again! It was a privilege"!

"The hinge question is a great way to get the pupils to enter a greater depth of thinking which further improves their understanding of a topic. All the answers of the hinge questions can be correct or there can be red herrings in there to check pupils understanding of the topic being covered".

"I was very impressed with your insistence on the use of clear and precise language, superbly modelled through your exposition and instructions. Also, I was impressed with the maturity of the debate on feminism and how the students were encouraged to formulate balanced and objective judgements".

"There was a trust amongst them which made for a really safe and relaxed atmosphere, a love for this subject has clearly been nurtured"!

"I very much enjoyed the opportunity to view a lesson from another department. I was particularly impressed with the attention to detail evident in pupils' work regarding drawing diagrams and charts as this represents a clear cross over with Maths. I also got further ideas about transitioning from one part of the lesson to another... I would like to investigate ways to make these transitions flow even more smoothly".
