

The nature of God:

God's qualities

Practices Islam:

Five Pillars of Sunni Islam & the Ten Obligatory Acts of Shi'a Islam

Shahadah: declaration of faith and its place in Muslim practice.

Salah - times, directions, ablution (wudu), movements (rak'ahs) and recitations - in the home - mosque and elsewhere; Friday prayer: Jummah; key differences in the practice of salah in Sunni and Shi'a Islam

Sawm: fasting during the month of Ramadan

Zakah: the role and significance of giving alms including origins

Hajj: pilgrimage to Makkah including origins - actions pilgrims perform at sites

Jihad: greater and lesser jihad

Festivals: Id-ul-Adha, Id-ul-Fitr, Ashura.

Controversial Issues: Abortion – Euthanasia – Animal Experimentation

Origins and value of the universe& human life - relationship between scientific views and religious views.

Protecting the world - , stewardship, dominion, responsibility, awe and wonder.

Use and abuse of the environment, including the use of natural resources, pollution.

Use and abuse of animals, including: animal experimentation, food.

Sanctity of life - Quality of life

Death and the afterlife - their impact on beliefs about the value of human life

Theme D: Religion, peace and conflict

Violence – violent protest

terrorism - war -holy war - just war

Pacifism - peace -

justice- forgiveness - reconciliation

Reasons for war - including greed, self-defence, religion and retaliation

Weapons of mass destruction - Nuclear weapons - nuclear deterrence.

Victims of war including the work of one present day religious organisation.

Theme E: Religion, crime and punishment

Types of punishment: Corporal - Death penalty – Prison - Community Service Good and evil intentions/ actions

Causes of crime - poverty - upbringing - mental illness - addiction - greed - hate - opposition to an unjust law.

Types of crime - hate crimes – crimes against person – property – state Aims of punishment- retribution –deterrence - reformation. Forgiveness.
