Penwortham Girls' High School has been awarded the Silver Rights Respecting School Award by UNICEF UK and is the first secondary school in Lancashire to achieve it.

UNICEF is the world's leading organisation working for children and their rights.

The Rights Respecting School Award is granted to schools that show commitment to promoting and realising children's rights and encouraging adults, children and young people to respect the rights of others in school. Silver is given to schools that make excellent progress towards embedding the principles of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child into its ethos and curriculum. There are over 1200 schools across England, Scotland, Northern Ireland and Wales that have achieved Silver and over 500 schools that have been awarded Gold, the highest accolade granted by UNICEF UK.

Sharon Hall, Deputy Headteacher said, "We are very proud to have gained the Silver Rights Respecting Schools Award which recognises the hard work the students, staff and the wider community have put into learning about the rights that our students enjoy. The RRSA has a positive impact on students and the school as a whole, encouraging discussion, helping students to articulate their views and ensuring they learn about the experiences of children around the world."

The Award recognises achievement in placing the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the

Child at the heart of a school's planning, policies and practice. A Rights Respecting School is a community where children's rights are learned, taught, practised, respected, protected and promoted.

Empathy Week

Deer and Online Abuse and Period Equality (21st-25th February 2022)



During Empathy Week 2022, we promoted the importance of empathy during assemblies scheduled for every year group. Empathy is strongly linked with our school core values which include social responsibility, compassion, dignity, and resilience.

Empathy Week is a global schools programme that uses the power of film to develop the skills of empathy and leadership in students across 40+ countries and 6 continents. So far over 100,000 students have been engaged in the previous two years, even through the pandemic. This year, the theme for Empathy Week is 'Passion and Purpose' and beyond the assemblies, there is an opportunity for your daughter to become involved in an 'Empathy Action Project' and work alongside the Respect Council.

As a school, we are aware that peer and online abuse is an increasing issue and we want to form a focus group of students that we can work with to ensure that all students are informed about this, know how to stay safe and know where they can access help and support if they need it.

Additionally, we have also been provided by the Department for Education with a supply of free period products to enable all learners to participate fully in education by making period products available as and when they are needed. Research shows that 1 in 14 girls say they have missed schools as they could not afford or access period products. We have found that some girls are hesitant to access these free period products and we want to ascertain their views so they can access period products freely when needed.

We are aiming to get a sound representation of student voice and action from across the school and make a real positive difference.

Governors News

he governing board has had another busy term, albeit one of the shortest.

It has been incredible to see so many parents engage in our Parent Governor Election also; I think there were more votes than I have ever known! Governors met a couple of weeks ago to confirm the election decisions and to welcome the two new parent governors. At the same time, we also confirmed the nomination of our Local Authority Governor.

It is worth mentioning here that each school's governing board has several different governor categories. We have 2 parent governors, 1 local authority governor, 1 staff governor, the Headteacher and 10 co-opted or community governors. Each governor has his or her own nominated role and we enjoy many visits (in normal times) to school to carry these out. You may also see many of us at school events. Each category of governor might be appointed in a different way, but each governor has the same rights as any other and no one governor can act alone; we are a corporate body.

We have, despite intermittent restrictions, conducted a great many visits and training sessions again this term. Many governors attended school during the STEM festival, as I did, and I also visited many classrooms while students were completing the class quiz at the end of the festival also! Things were extremely competitive! The buzz around school was palpable and it was clear to see the impact on the students, and on the staff. Well done to all concerned – it was a huge success. That same week, I attended staff professional development sessions related to safeguarding and to Special Educational Needs so there was also evidence of the serious side of teaching. PGHS staff have an incredible ability to motivate and create enjoyable learning experiences for the girls, whilst at the same time creating a safe and caring environment. We are so lucky to be part of this school community.

KS3 E-safety Drop Down Session -Thursday 10th March 2022


S3 students recently spent an afternoon looking at certain aspects of e-safety.

This educational experience included classroom workshops, diver talks and the opportunity to view a range of marine forms in preparation for our Art & Design Unit 2 Sculpture Project.

Throughout the day, students were fully engaged with a wide range of activities, looking at textures and learning about the biodiversity in our precious coral reefs. Environmental issues were also discussed and we explored ways of protecting our marine habitats.

It is aimed that over the following months, Year 7 will use this visit as a useful reference source for observational drawing and textural clay sculptures. We look forward to sharing examples of our student's work later this academic year.

Fine Art Workshop at Newman College – Year 10

The session aimed to explore the use of printmaking within a 'Natural Forms' theme. Under instruction from subject specialist Andrea Chaunce, our students worked carefully to scratch into pre-prepared acetate blocks. These printing plates were later applied with a thin layer of ink and printed onto paper using the printing press.

We took students from a variety of CAT Faculty subjects. The students thoroughly enjoyed the experience of touring the College, viewing the Atrium Exhibition, exploring the Photography Studios and being able to experiment with a new technical process for their portfolio work.

Textiles Workshop at Newman College – Year 10

This included a number of students from across the CAT Faculty groups from GCSE Art & Design, Textiles and Photography.


We were very lucky to receive a guided tour of the Art studios and the Atrium Exhibition area, where there were some amazing artworks produced by the Art Foundation students. Our students were able to ask questions and enjoyed looking around the exhibition. It was a great opportunity for our students to see what the options are for them within Art & Design and Textiles Post-16. An insight into college life was also very interesting and may help influence our student's Post-16 choices.

Our workshop consisted of a whole afternoon in one of the specialist Textiles rooms, led by an experienced A-Level teacher. The specific nature of the workshop was experimentation of dysperse dyes used in conjunction with other design techniques. Our students were given the theme of 'Natural Forms' and were presented with their own pack of resources prepared by the college.

They were taught how to adapt photographs of Natural Forms into abstract patterns on fabric using the dysperse dye technique. Once students had their design transferred onto the fabric, they were then shown a variety of techniques to hand-embellish the designs with stitch and beading.

Our students were a credit to our school, working positively with the teachers at Newman, showing enthusiasm and really enjoying the workshop. A great afternoon was had by all and we look forward to working together with Newman on further trips such as this.





Hello Geographers! Another eventful term is coming to a close and as always, the standard of work and enthusiasm seen by the Geography staff have really impressed us.

Year 11 – the home straight!

Tust this week, Year 11 classes have completed the GCSE course content, meaning we can now look ahead to an effective and focused period of exam preparation.

As we checked through the notes produced over the two-year course, I was struck by the quality of the work and feel confident that the Year 11 students have the foundations on which to build great success in Geography. The Department will provide a suggested study programme for the Easter break and beyond. There are also a wealth of materials and past papers available on the SharePoint for each Year 11 class.

On the 3rd and 4th March, we had our Year 11 fieldtrip to survey the River Calder to the north east of Garstang. This gave students an insight into the work of hydrologists. We surveyed the depth, width, velocity and bedload of the river and calculated discharge from our data. Aside from a few wet socks, we came through the trip unscathed, although Mr Ward had a close call when chasing after one of our floats down the river! Thanks to the accompanying staff and to the students, who despite some poor weather were full of enthusiasm and took their responsibilities to collect good quality data very seriously.

Easter Holidays – a chance to see some Geography

here have been some excellent programmes on T.V. lately that fit nicely with our topics of study.

In Year 9, there is 'Fierce Earth' which is available on BBC iPlayer, which has episodes on earthquakes and volcanoes

For Year 8, there is another BBC series, 'Earth's Great Rivers', again available on BBC iPlayer, which really helps with the understanding of a river as a system, travelling from source to mouth.

In Year 7, there are a couple of good Stacey Dooley documentaries out there about migration ('Migrant Kids in Crisis' and 'Border Wars'). Parents, please be advised that both come with warnings about upsetting scenes.

Better than all of these is of course getting out into some Geography! Walk up a hill or along a river/canal, visit somewhere new on the train, go and explore a piece of the coast that you have not been to before; Geography is all around us! Have a lovely break.

Year 7

The current topic of study on population and migration is particularly topical.

The UN predicts that they will declare the 'Day of 8 Billion' at some time in late 2022 or the first quarter of 2023. This will be a milestone for human population and one we may struggle to cope with. The second part of the topic will look at migration and this will see us focus on those fleeing Ukraine, the largest movement of refugees in Europe since World War II. We will look at the routes, destinations and struggles that those people face.

Year 9

ear 9 are currently embarking on a real Geography classic – tectonics, volcanoes and earthquakes.

This topic is fundamental to understanding our planet and we have committed to teaching it at almost GCSE standard to give students a flavour of the levels expected on the course and to smooth the transition to Year 10.

Holocaust Exhibition and Learning Centre

n Wednesday, 2nd March, forty Year 9 students travelled to the University of Huddersfield and attended a workshop at the Holocaust Exhibition and Learning Centre.

Year 9 have been studying the Holocaust over recent weeks, discussing why and how the Holocaust happened. The University's workshop gave us the opportunity to deepen our understanding and engage with some new and challenging ideas.

Specifically, Year 9 considered the difficulties that can be encountered when ascribing the roles of Victim, Perpetrator, Collaborator and Bystander to figures in this period. We also spent time discussing the objects and displays in the exhibition and ended the day with a tour of the university campus.

University staff were keen to state afterwards just how impressed they were with our students. Their depth of understanding, knowledge and sensitivity was clear throughout the day.

Mr Herbert, Mr Ramsdale, Miss Todd and myself were exceptionally proud of Year 9 and the manner in which they represented our school. It is clear that the year group contains a fine bunch of historians!

uring the Year 8 Maths lessons, students were given opportunity to learn about what a payslip looks like and what to look out for on these.

It may be quite a while before they actually see one of these of their own, but the importance of seeing one now and how this links to the maths they are currently learning is invaluable.

Students were very intrigued to know about what a tax code is and their national insurance number and when they will receive these. They were not aware of how a few numbers in the tax code could impact the amount of tax each of us pay and the amount we end up taking home.

We then moved onto looking at the deductions, learning about when we pay income tax and the brackets of income tax that we can fall into. They also learned what national insurance is and how much we have to pay; they couldn't believe that you started paying for national insurance at £9750 but income tax was

£12500. Thankfully now, the government has made this a lot simpler, and they are both the same!

Overall, students were very keen to see where the money they earn goes and how tax and national insurance is calculated.

Year 9 Edge Hill University Mathematics Challenge 2021-2022

Students in Year 9 have been presented with an extracurricular opportunity to enter for the Edge Hill University Mathematics Challenge 2021-2022.

This is an annual competition organised by the Faculty of Education at the university specifically for Year 9 (England and Wales), S2 (Scotland) and Year 10 (Northern Ireland) students.

The challenge aims to immerse students in mathematics whilst making the subject fun. It provides students with the opportunity to tackle engaging mathematical activities, while developing teamwork and communication skills and allows students to explore alternative ways of solving problems; skills which are transferable in the real world.

Students were initially presented with two different mathematical problems, of which they were asked to choose one of them, solve the problem as a team and present their solution as a poster. Their posters have been sent to the university and the judging panel there will select the groups from all the qualifying entries from across the country. These teams will then be entered to the second stage of the competition, where they are then sent another set of problems to choose from and solve. The problems presented in each stage of the competition are very different from the mathematical work associated with Key Stage 3 and 4 mathematics.

As this challenge was extracurricular, it was lovely to see so many Year 9 students give up their own time during break, lunch and outside of school to work together and attempt to solve their initial problem as a team. The teams that have entered are:

This term, year 10 have enjoyed stepping into the shoes of journalists to investigate the miracle at Lourdes.




Live Zoom with Mr Bourne
